We'll read a short story together, usually a new book, and then afterwards, work on an easy, but fun craft or activity with all materials provided.

Discovery of Learning (DOL): Homeschoolers aged 6-11 from 2-3 PM in the Children's Department, We'll read and talk about different subjects (Science, technology, languages, the arts, cultures, nature, history, literature, etc.), learn how to research these subjects using library and internet resources, learn digital skills and about various devices, and provide instruction and materials for a thought-provoking experiment, craft, or art project to go with each week's theme. Children will have use of STEM Kits, ChromeBooks, homework help and library resources. Every third Wednesday we will cook!




